- I acknowledge your courage and determination to continue your education away from family and friends, and for some of you, in an English speaking country when English is not your first language.
- I have lived overseas twice in my career, but I had it relatively easy, both times
   were in a country where English was widely spoken.
- The first time I lived overseas was in America, and this was before social media, before email was widely used, so I communicated with family and friends by writing letters, and maybe the occasional phone call if I could afford it! It's hard to imagine that now!
- With Facebook, WhatsApp, Wechat, Instagram (and the list goes on) you have the opportunity to stay connected instantly which I'm sure has been a great comfort.
- Facebook only emerged 11 years ago, and yet today, if it was a country, Facebook would be the largest country in the world with a population of over 1.5 billion.
- And what did we do before we had Google to help us answer every possible
  question, important questions when moving to a new city such as such as 'which
  nights are the shops open late in Adelaide?' or 'where can I find authentic
  Chinese, Malaysia, Indonesian food in Adelaide?'

- Make the most of every stage of your career, not just for the skills you will develop,
   but also the contacts you will make and the opportunity to make an impression.

- Because while the world is changing at a rapid pace and ongoing personal
  development is important, I believe there are qualities that will stand the test of
  time and put you in the best possible position to be successful in your chosen
  career. These qualities include passion, professionalism, integrity and dedication.
- One of my favourite aspects of this role is that I have the opportunity to meet you,
  the students (and now graduands) and you all certainly have the passion and
  dedication to succeed, otherwise you wouldn't be here today. I love hearing about
  your journey to be here and your dreams for the future your enthusiasm and
  warmth never ceases to amaze me.
- For those of you who aim to stay in South Australia, we are honoured that you
  have chosen to make South Australia your home for the immediate future, and we
  will no doubt benefit from the contribution you will make to our economy and
  community. I look forward to crossing paths with you out in the workforce.
- To the graduands who are returning home, or moving elsewhere, I hope you take
  with you many wonderful memories of your time in South Australia, and that you
  become life-long advocates for the State.
- And I have a favour to ask you, which is to continue to share your positive
  experiences in Adelaide with friends and family back home, as we need all of you
  to help us spread the word about Adelaide.
